The following list of organizations describes programs that specialize in re-entry. Some are focused around job search assistance and offer a variety of services and assistance. Most of these organizations ask that you call first to ask about orientation sessions or to make an appointment.

72 Hour Fund

The 72 Hour Fund is part of Doing HIS Time, a Christian prison ministry. The name of the program, 72 Hour Fund, refers to the critical first hours after release from prison. Contact them if you need help with identification documents, bus tokens, professional clothing, job counseling, shelter referrals, or any other immediate need.

The Community Re-Entry Project is a nonprofit organization that provides a variety of re-entry resources under one roof. These resources include case management, job resources, short-term housing placement and referrals, treatment services, family reunification services, and educational services. Contact them for additional information. Family members of incarcerated people may also contact Community Re-Entry Project with questions and concerns.

- While focused on people coming out of jail in Denver, Community Re-Entry Project may also help people coming out of prison and returning to Denver.
- Hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 8 am to 5 pm; Tuesday and Thursday from 9 am to 7 pm.

DOC Re-entry Specialists DOC

DOC re-entry specialists work for the Division of Adult Parole, Community Corrections and Youthful Offender System. They are called Community Re-entry Specialists by the department. Their job is to focus on re-entry services in the community. A DOC re-entry specialist may be able to help you with your job search, bus tokens, ID, applying for benefits, finding housing, paperwork, clothing vouchers, tools, and educational information.

- In Denver, DOC re-entry specialists are at the John Inmann Work and Family Center. The phone number is 303.825.1115. Call for the current location.
- Outside of Denver, DOC re-entry specialists are assigned to parole offices in Grand Junction (970.255.9126), Colorado Springs (719.635.0800), and Pueblo (719.546.0009). A DOC re-entry specialist will also be located in Westminster, but the office information is not yet available. The DOC may be adding more re-entry specialists. Ask your parole officer if there's one in your area.
- Most of the time you can drop by one of these parole offices, but it's a good idea to call first.
- Due to their funding, DOC re-entry specialists can only help people on parole.

The Empowerment Program also has support services for women who have been incarcerated. The Empowerment Program is a licensed drug and alcohol treatment provider.

Located inside the Denver Inner City Parish, Project ReNew is a nonprofit program that works with men and women living in Denver after release from prison. People who qualify for the program receive help with a number of services, including mentoring (individual and family), job search, rent assistance, work clothing, food baskets, transportation, and bus tokens/passes. Project ReNew is *not* a drop-in program. To receive these services, you must commit to the program for one year. During that year, you must meet with Project ReNew staff on a weekly basis, including home visits. If you're interested in Project ReNew, call first to see if you qualify for the program and to make an appointment.
